The Underappreciated Steward

Several years ago, I performed the difficult task of telling a Carrier that we would be unable to save his job unless he immediately enrolled in drug-rehabilitation. This particular Carrier's Shop Steward was sitting at his side. The Shop Steward immediately volunteered to drive the Carrier to the clinic, and ended up spending much of the night helping him out. Over the next several months, the Steward went out to this Carrier's house, spoke with his family members, and did everything possible to get this Carrier back on track and back to work. I have seen Shop Stewards go beyond the extra mile, performing health and welfare visits, taking Carriers to the hospital, and helping Carriers through horrible life crises.

What is a Shop Steward? Webster's states that he or she is: "A union member elected as the union representative of a shop or department in

dealings with the management." True, but a Steward is also so much more than this. It has been my experience that a Steward is also a:

1. Negotiator
2. Mediator
3. Counselor
4. Defender
5. Advisor
6. Confidant
7. Appealer
8. Contract Interpreter
9. Guardian

And so much more... Why do Stewards volunteer to do so much for their fellow Letter Carriers? Is it the extra pay that they receive? According to our current branch bylaws, a Shop Steward receives about \$50.00 per month in salary. If a Shop Steward attends the monthly branch training, giving up an entire night to study the contract, he or she can earn about

\$40.00 more per month. So the question is whether \$90.00 per month is worth filing all the grievances, conducting all the investigations, dealing with all the problems, answering all the questions, learning all the contract answers, making all the phone calls, staying up at night thinking about issues, making all the deadlines, and helping all the people in a zone? My answer has been the same for the last 8 years. You will never get rich working for the Union. We just don't have the budget to pay what the job is worth. Much of the work done will never be recompensed. The answer, short and sweet, is that \$90.00 is much too little for the amount of work, stress, and anguish that our Shop Stewards go through.

So why do they do it? The answer must be because someone has to step up and fight for our col-

lective rights. Sometimes it is just a matter of it being "your turn" to represent your fellow Carriers. Our ranks are full of Carriers who have been Stewards in the past. Our ranks are full of Carriers who will be Stewards in the future. Thank goodness for people who are willing to take up the fight for our collective rights. Without them we would be at the mercy of a corporation that only sees us as a number on a sheet of paper, or a resource to be used up and discarded. I am grateful for every Shop Steward that ever stood up for me and fought for my rights, whether it was for me specifically, or when it was for the whole zone.

Too often, being a Steward is a thankless job. Stewards go into the job knowing that there will be disagreements with management. And often they are surprised to find out how many disagreements they have with some Carriers. Too often I have heard Carriers disparaging or slandering the name of their Shop Steward, accusing them of not doing a

Call out for COLCPE!!

All the chatter and talk is the USPS proposing, (via testimony from Jack Potter), cutting our workweek to five days. At first glance working five days and having weekends off would be ideal for most of us Carriers. Weekends off forever, what a deal!! But, will the elimination of the six-day help the declining status of the Postal Service or will it further exacerbate the declining service we provide? Will the five-day workweek eliminate jobs?

We cannot argue that the USPS is in financial purgatory. The GAO estimates USPS will lose more than \$7 billion in Fiscal Years 2009 and 2010 with mail volume continually declining. Healthcare costs will continue to escalate and our mandate to deliver every house at a universal rate will be financially impossible. Jack Potter testimony stated we, as a company will lose 30 billion pieces of First Class mail this year alone. The USPS faces a year-end cash short fall of 700 million dollars after reaching our borrowing limits to meet our operational needs. Unless Congress intervenes and makes changes we simply do not have enough money to cover our expenses and operational needs.

So, our fate relies on our elected official in the House and Senate. To some that scenario might seem frightening. How can we rely on Washington to make sure the USPS will be viable? Will Congress listen to the needs of the worker over the needs of the Company? Will Congress implement our Postmasters plan and eliminate our postal network by shutting down and eliminate an already shrinking service? Does Postal Management have credibility with Congress when it comes to fixing the needs of our Service? Working for the Postal Service for 15 years and witnessing the style of our Managers leaves me with serious

doubts that our leaders have the correct answers. Luckily members of Congress have faith and trust in Letter Carriers. Congress loves Letter Carriers and they listen to us when we lobby. When Letter Carriers meet with Congress and propose ideas, the majority of them normally implement our proposals via legislation. Even in Utah, the reddest state in our country, our Senators and Congressmen have backed our legislation. The NALC plans to expand our service rather than to eliminate an already shrinking service has strong support in Washington. Just recently Letter Carrier Chad Mortensen was at a town hall meeting with Congressman Rob Bishop who announced that Chad was his Postal Expert. Rob Bishop even co-sponsored our House Bill (HR 22) after months of lobbying. Congressman Jason Chaffetz ranking House member concerning HR 22 signed on as a co-sponsor after Letter Carrier Fred Downey convinced him it was good for the USPS. Republican and Democrat will open their doors and sit and listen to our ideas and ask Letter Carriers for their support. How did we get the ear of Congress and why do they support our issues?

I would be naïve to say they support us because it's the right thing to do. They love us because we have COLCPE and Car-

rier Corps. We give money to their campaigns and work for them to get re-elected. We give money, which opens the doors to speak with them on our issues. I truly believe that our future will be tied to our legislation efforts of the NALC. Our legislation depends on Letter Carriers contributing to COLCPE. Every Letter Carrier has to contribute to COLCPE to continue our success with Congress by giving five dollars per pay period taken directly from your paycheck. Our branch already has over 120 members contributing to COLCPE. I ask all of you who reads this to expeditiously sign up for COLCPE. You can call our Branch and it literally takes five minutes to sign you up. Call or email me and I will make sure that your contribution is done immediately. Jeff Asay is our branch COLCPE coordinator and he will gladly help you through the process. At this moment in our careers we need to make sure that our jobs are secure and by signing up for COLCPE will be the first step in making sure that we do have careers for years to come.

Open Season will be from Nov. 9th to Dec. 14th.

Here are a few ways to check out the CIGNA Preferred Provider List to see if your doctor is a participant in the Network.

Contact me for the List that is from Nov. 2008 to present. In Oct. 2009, I'll receive another book that will cover participants from Oct. 2009 to the end of the year 2009. But be aware that when a provider/doctor signs their contract it may overlap in years. For example they may have signed up in July 2009, so their contract will end in July 2010.

Anybody can call anytime. Just a Hint: NALC Headquarters told me the best time to call is during Open Season, around the end of November and the first part of December, which is the last couple of weeks of Open Season.

If you have any problems finding out, call me. My contact information to reach me will be printed at the bottom of this article.

If your doctor is NOT a participant in the Network:

I can give you a form. You fill it out and Fax and/ or take it to our Salt Lake Branch 111 office; or get it to me personally. I fax it to NALC Health Benefit headquarters.

NALC sends a packet to your doctor or if you like they can send it to me and I will get to your doctor. You also can take it to your doctor. It is urgent that if you want to try to get your doctor to sign up with the Network you need to fill the forms out as soon as possible. Sooner we get these forms in, the sooner the process can get started, even if it is BEFORE Open Season.

The State Convention takes place every 2 years, elected officers will be taking the reins and guiding the state in a direction that will benefit all carriers in the great State of Utah. Quick note on Mutual Benefits. I have brochures in the office for those who would like to review the many insurance options that the NALC has to offer.

As Letter Carriers our lively-hood depends upon several necessities and one big one is our feet, so here is some help:

Tips for Foot Care

Take care of your feet regularly to keep calluses under control. Use a pumice stone or an abrasive foot scrub to

remove the dead and rough skin. . If this skin is not removed it will become hard and thick and can become cracked and infected making walking difficult.

Check your feet daily for cuts, blisters, bruises or color changes, swelling and open sores. Report them to your healthcare physician without delay. Use a mirror to see the soles of your feet or, if this is difficult, seek help from someone else. Don't ignore pain: Painful feet are not normal. Many foot conditions can be cured if you visit a chiropodist as early as possible. Always wash your feet with soap and water. Take care to wash between your toes. Dry your feet carefully, especially between the toes. Use oil or lotion to keep your skin soft.

Trim toe nails with a nail trimmer. Cut them straight across and not too short. Do not cut down the corner as this can lead to in growing toenails. Patients with diabetes should have their nails cut by a State Registered Chiropodist. Replace your shoes every 6 months as well-worn shoes lose their ability to support your feet properly. This can lead to feet, leg and back fatigue and problems. Our job requires us to be on our feet all day it is best you change your shoes every 6 months. If you've tried everything to mend calloused, painfully cracked heels and nothing worked, look for Callex Ointment.

During the shoe fitting process, make sure there is enough space (3/8" to 1/2") from your longest toe at the end of each shoe when you are standing up. Give your feet a foot bath. Put a cup of marbles in the bath water and roll your feet around on top of them to stimulate the nerve endings. Pick up the marbles with your toes, flex and contract your feet and toes and then let go off the marbles. This will allow the arches and muscles of the feet to stretch.




Don't wait in line on Election Day! You can have your ballot mailed to you on an on-going basis. Any registered voter may apply for **Permanent Vote By Mail**. In order to be eligible for permanent vote by mail status, you must be a registered voter at the address listed on your permanent vote by mail application. You will receive your ballot in the mail at least three weeks prior to each election. You may vote and return the ballot immediately, you may wait to return the ballot as long as it is postmarked the day before the election, or you may drop your voted ballot at any polling location. Also, you may surrender your ballot at your assigned polling location on Election Day, or at an early voting location, and vote on an electronic voting machine.


